Message from Rev'd Noel



Mark 1:9-15

When a potter makes an object on the wheel, if it goes wrong they just squash it up and start again. Don't you sometimes wish you could do that with life? With your own life? With the world? Today's world familiar with new starts. It calls them "relaunches". Some politicians and pop stars do them continually. They are often more spin than substance, and it is frequently difficult to see what has really changed afterwards. But not just frustrated human beings that call for a new start. So does Jesus. At the very beginning of His ministry, and all the way through, he called on people to "repent and believe the Good News." Although this word "repent" has become weakened today to the point where it means no more than "be sorry", the words Jesus used meant a great deal more than that! Both the Greek word Mark uses and the Hebrew word behind it implied a complete change of attitude and way of life. It meant a complete revolution. A turning round and going in the opposite direction. A returning to God and allowing Him to rule your life. There was no saying sorry and then going and doing the same things all over again. True repentance meant a complete new beginning. And this time of Lent gives us the

chance to examine ourselves once more to see if we are indeed travelling God's way, if we have indeed made this new start. And, if we have not, to "repent and believe the Good News". So what, then, is this new start to which Jesus calls us?

I. NEW BEGINNING

Jesus made a new beginning at baptism. He left behind his old life as carpenter at Nazareth and committed himself to task his Father had called him to. Later he calls others to make same choice (Mark 1: 16-20). This involved abandoning home, family, livelihood and living according to God's will. There was no going back. Jesus may or may not be calling us to leave home or work, but he is certainly calling us to leave behind old life lived for self, and to live a new life with God in control. This involves working for God as well

as living for Him. God's work and mission are our work and our mission, not just His. They belong to us all and not just to those called to full-time service. This also means our lives must be worthy of our Master. Are they? If not, repent, return to God. Receive the forgiveness He offers us in Christ, and make a new beginning!

2. NEW TESTING

Immediately after Jesus had committed himself to Father's mission, the Spirit "throws him out" (like a heavenly bouncer!) into the desert where he is tested. Note God's active role in this. Didn't just allow Jesus to be tested, but pushed him into it! Testing an essential part of serving God. The person who has not undergone testing is either a very new Christian, or one who has ducked every challenge and has therefore been unfaithful to their Master. If even Jesus was tested, we cannot expect preferential treatment. And we are not just talking about sexual sin and chocolate. We are talking about pride or undue humility. Laziness or undue busy-ness. Ignoring prayer or excessive religiosity, We are engaged in a constant battle with the forces of evil. We are tested also through suffering, through enforced idleness, through disappointment and disaster. The people of Israel, Moses (on Sinai), and Elijah went through such times. So must we. Only if we face the test, holding firm to God and His way, can we be sure we have truly made the new start Jesus asks of us. He never promised us an easy ride. But If we hold firm to the end, we will share in His glorious kingdom.

3. NEW SUPPORT

It seems a tail order. A new way of life, new tasks to perform, and a constant battle with the forces of evil and with tests of various kinds. But Jesus had help. The Holy Spirit descended on him at baptism and angels ministered to him in desert. As we follow Jesus and continue his ministry, God will not leave us without help. The Spirit given to Jesus was given to all church at Pentecost. He is available to us in our struggle and work. God will never leave us without resources. All the riches of the Spirit are at our disposal. We also have the spiritual forces of goodness working alongside and outside of us. God is working in us and around us to accomplish His will

CONCLUSION

Therefore, let us heed Jesus^{*} call and make the New Start he asks for, making a new beginning in our lives - living and working for God, not ourselves; facing up to and holding fast in the new testing this new beginning will bring in its wake; and doing all with the help of the new support God gives us through the power of His Holy Spirit working in us and through His own work outside of us and around us, so our lives may be to the praise and glory of God's Holy Name and so we may, at last share in His kingdom in glory. AMEN.

At the end of November, we were delighted to welcome over 160 five, six and seven year olds and their teachers and helpers, from 3 local schools, into church to share the Christmas story with us and join in a variety of activities. In small groups, the children met different characters from the story (some are pictured above!). Having listened to each story, the children enjoyed making paper 'Marys' and 'Josephs' and hanging them on a Christmas tree. They also completed a maze helping the Wise men to find the stable, unscrambled Christmas words and wrote or drew about what makes them feel special. There is a display in the church hall showing more of what we did.

Each session finished with us sharing in singing a Christmas song accompanied by the organ. We then sent the children off back to school with a colourful Christmas card each, to remind them of the true meaning of Christmas and of their time at LMC.

Whilst this is hard work and challenging for the dedicated interactive team, it is a joyful experience and we are much encouraged by the positive feedback from schools.

Notes from the Stewards' Team

Following Rev'd Jane's early retirement due to ill health and some reorganisation within the circuit, Rev'd Noel Nhariswa took over pastoral care for LMC from last September, initially for 12 months. We have been pleased to have Noel's leadership and guidance at our meetings and welcome his desire to get to know us and to share in LMC's worship and activities.

However, matters remain unsettled in the circuit at present. We went through the stationing process at the end of last year to try and appoint a new presbyter to the circuit. This was successfully achieved just before Christmas when the Rev'd Brain Hutton accepted the invitation to join the circuit in September this year with pastoral responsibility, initially, for Daventry, Broadwell and ourselves. We were delighted by this news but, unfortunately, it was quickly followed by another unsettling announcement. The Methodist Church UK is struggling to fill all its superintendent and presbyter vacancies. With the appointment of Rev'd. Brain to our East Mercia circuit, it was deemed that our circuit is 'overstaffed', something we, as stewards, find hard to understand since we only see a presbyter once a month for a service. However, we do appreciate that other circuits are in even more difficult situations. This has resulted in our East Mercia Superintendent, Rev'd Andrew Farrington, agreeing to move, from September this year, to the Leicester Trinity Circuit as Superintendent, which is seriously understaffed. So, the East Mercia circuit is once again needing to reorganise itself, not least to agree which of the current staff will take on the superintendency duties. We hope to hear the outcomes of the Circuit Leadership Team's deliberations very soon and will update all members at LMC accordingly.

All our stewards' meetings have a full agenda and are carefully minuted. We are required to include agenda items such as Safeguarding and Equality, Diversity and Inclusion (EDI) but we always also include a review of events that have taken place and planning for upcoming events, as well as updating ourselves on fundraising, church finances and property issues.

As well as trying to ensure the smooth running of thechurch from week to week, the stewards are involved in many different aspects of the church's life from organising rotas and lettings, running and supporting various events and outreach activities, to safeguarding, fund-raising and managing the finances. There's never a dull moment! We are also expected to attend training in EDI and Unconscious Bias. These are mandatory courses for preachers, stewards and some officers across the Methodist Church.

Looking back over the festive season, LMC was a very busy place! Events included the 'open church' on the evening of the town's switching on of the Christmas lights, our interactive event for local school children, our Christmas Tree Festival weekend, our Carol Service and a Christingle service for the Brownies and their families. A communion service on Christmas Eve and a Christmas morning service were also much appreciated.

Looking forward, the fundraising committee has created an exciting programme of events for the next few months. There will also be special services for Ash Wednesday and Maundy Thursday whilst the Bible Study Fellowship will be studying a Lent course. We'll be making Mothering Sunday posies again to put on the railings for passers-by and running a Schools' Easter interactive event. All are welcome to donate flowers and/or, assist with this activity. The more the merrier!

Alongside the church finances, finding folk to take on some of the essential roles in church continues to be a worry. Currently, we are particularly in need of someone to take on the role of Church Council Secretary. We thank Jess for her time in the role. However, we have much to be thankful for and pray for God's guidance as we seek the way forward for LMC.



Notes from the Treasurers

We are pleased to report that we continue to hold our heads above water as we move into 2024, although not by much! We have managed to put sufficient funds on one side to pay the compulsory Circuit Assessment requirements in February and May (approximately £4500 each) whilst holding, we hope, sufficient funds in the Current Account to pay the gas bill each month during the Winter (about £900 per month).

Some amazing news is that we have received an unexpected bequest of $\pm 10,000$ which is extremely generous. Together with some other funds, specifically designated for the renovation of the toilet block, we should be able to move ahead with this. In order to further help fund this, we will apply to the Circuit for a grant, once we have three up to date quotes for the work needed: the maximum they will award is ± 5000 .

In addition, we hold $\pounds 2500$ in Fundraising as we make a start towards funding the next big project, renewal of the very elderly boiler and heating system! We are extremely grateful to the fund raising group for what they have raised so far, and I encourage you all to support them in the wide variety of activities they are planning over the rest of 2024. We can have some fun whilst we raise money!
